THE MOST IMPORTANT THING TO HAPPEN IN DOBWALLS SINCE THE BY-PASS-AND IT WILL BE YOURS TO ENJOY FOR EVER-THE DOBWALLS OPEN SPACE PROJECT

The chair of Dobwalls Parish Council John Dunn has described what's happening in two fields on the edge of the village as: "A once-in-a-lifetime oportunity for the village and new Dobwalls Parish Council to provide a much-needed open space area for the community to enjoy".

And, he's spot on! The project is the most significant initiative for this area since the creation of the by-pass and its benefits will endure for generations.

It's all come about because the former Dobwalls and Trewidland Parish Council was successful in obtaining funds allocated to Cornwall Council through a legal planning agreement drawn up when the Wainhomes development was built.

The agreement means the money can only be spent on specific projects so the parish council decided to go ahead with the purchase of the two fields. The first part of the project is to provide land for more sports pitches which will be managed by Dobwalls Football Club. This land is almost twice the size of the existing football club facility and will give the club scope to develop for the



future.

At present there are 13 adult and junior teams using the present limited space and it's hoped the newly available area will attract others who wish to use the facility — not necessarily just for football.

Protecting and safeguarding the environment is vital for the future of the planet so the second

part of the project is an exciting initiative to provide a carbon-neutral area for the community to enjoy.

John Dunn said: "Wainhomes kindly agreed the funds could be used for this project, as opposed to the site the money was originally earmarked for. This was crucial to making this project possible."

Also, a $\pm 30,000$ Community Infrastructure Levy from Cornwall Council will be used to develop the area which will be designed to encourage family exercise and will include some space where people can just sit and relax or watch the children play.

The idea is to plant a forest with pathways through and around the area which families can enjoy. An orchard and wild flower meadow are also planned.

John Dunn added: "There will also be an area for village events which is also available for people just to enjoy the fresh air. Overall, it will be an open space for leisure and recreation.

"But, because of the nature of the funding, we can't provide play equipment or a hard standing area for a car park, so access will be for pedestrians only.

"The access road, which will be owned by the parish council, is for maintenance vehicles only and the residents of the houses down at Lantoom."

The open space project has only come about because of meetings involving the parish council, the football club, the school and others. And local Cornwall councillor Jane Pascoe and parish council clerk Linda Coles worked behind the scenes with Wainhomes and Cornwall Council to help make it happen.

The need for additional open and green space was clearly idientified by people's comments during the public consultation exercise as part of the process to create the Neighbourhood Development Plan.

A final word from John Dunn: "The input of the public and the money from Wainhomes to buy the necessary land allowed the parish council to look at the options and make a decision.

"It's going to take a bit of time to bring all this together but what a wonderful assest it will be for the community to enjoy for decades to come."

FOOTNOTE: It's possible the project could include a running track which the school and other organisations would benefit from.

YOUR PARISH COUNCILLORS

AN ELECTION was due to take place in May to choose nine councillors for the new Dobwalls Parish Council. As it happened, there was no election. Only six people were nominated so it was what's called an uncontested election. Those who put their names forward were all existing councillors and they have been elected without a contest.

Since then, one new councillor has been co-opted. So, there are still two vacancies to be filled to make up the full quota of nine.

The council has renewed its confidence in the chair and vice-chair John Dunn and Tracey Kitto and re-elected them to continue in their roles.

Here's a little bit about John and you can find out about Tracey and your other councillors throughout the magazine.

John Dunn -

I moved to the village in 1985 to take up the manager's position at the Liskeard Co-operative supermarket. All four of my children attended Dobwalls School and I was a school governor for around 20 years. I left the Co-op in 1989 to move into financial services.

I have been involved in local sport in one capacity or another, although these days it's as a spectator! I love gardening and I also have an allotment. The local area has changed dramatically over the years. Dobwalls has more



than doubled in size and we have the by-pass which was long overdue.

I was co-opted onto the council a number of years ago and although it is a voluntary position it can be stressful at times as well as rewarding.

We have been working on the Neighbourhood Development Plan for almost five years and, thankfully, it is now reaching completion.

we are also gradually making progress on the exciting community open space project for the village and the parish.

It has been both an honour and a previlege to act as chair of both the parish council and the plan steering group in recent years and the council is looking forward enthusiastically to what can be achieved in the years ahead.







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
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A FOND FAREWELL TO DOBWALLS FROM HUGH AND MHAIRI. HUGH FRANCIS HELPED WIN US THE BY-PASS AND MHAIRI MACKIE IS A KEY PLAYER IN THE CREATION OF THE NEIGHBOUR-HOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN, HELPING TO SHAPE THE FUTURE OF THE DOBWALLS AND TREWIDLAND AREA

Hugh Francis, who lives in Trewidland, has had a long career as a councillor in local government. He's getting on a bit so decided not to stand in the elections in May. Here, he says "Goodbye".

It was 1995 when I was elected as the member for Dobwalls & Trewidland on Caradon District Council. I'm not sure how it came about, but I do remember that I was unopposed - very fortunate!

Right from the start, the big issue was the need for Dobwalls to have a bypass. It is difficult for people who were not living in the village at that time



to imagine what the main road was like. On Saturdays in the summer months the traffic would queue back to Liskeard. And as the vehicles moved slowly through the village, the stench of diesel and petrol fumes was dreadful.

So the chairman of the parish council Derek Newton, county councillor George Hocking and I decided to do something about it. We called a meeting of villagers which was very well attended and we also had the support of our MP Colin Breed. From there, the protests started. One en-

terprising group continuously pressed the button on the pedestrian crossing traffic lights, so the lights were constantly on "red" which made the traffic jam even bigger.

The police were called and some villagers were threatened with arrest - probably for the only time in their lives!

We asked those in cars to write letters to their local MPs complaining about the traffic and demanding a by-pass.

Then I devised postcards which we handed to drivers queueing to get through the village.

The cards were pre-printed and addressed to government ministers at the Department for the Environment, Transport and the Regions and the top consultants advising the government on road projects. All the drivers had to do was fill in the date they were stuck in the traffic, stick a stamp on the card and post it. Ministers and officials were swamped with thousands of cards.. Meanwhile, Derek, George and I met Colin Breed at Westminster where Colin had arranged a meeting with the Roads Minister at which we set out our case.

Next, budget provision was included for Dobwalls to have its bypass. But that was only the start - alternative routes, environmental impact, public enquiry, consultations and so on - it went on for years. Then other envious authorities tried to highjack the money, claiming their need was greater than ours. When I was leader of Caradon Council, I remember attending a South West Transport Group meeting at which the Bristol member was adamant that Bristol needed a ring road more than Dobwalls needed a by-pass. But it was too late, the funds had been allocated and, of course, the by-pass was built.

One of the best things about that whole process was the uncompromising support from Dobwalls villagers. Never let anyone tell you that community action doesn't work. It does. But you have to be enthusiastic and stick with it. And you meet such lovely people while you are doing it!

I stopped representing Dobwalls and Trewidland when the district authority ceased to exist in 2009, but, a few years later, I joined Dobwalls & Trewidland Parish Council. Parish Councils have a lot more power than people realise, indeed more than most councillors realise! So it was good to see Dobwalls & Trewidland Parish Council flexing its muscles and initiating good ideas like the open space project in Dobwalls.

I have much enjoyed being a member of the "The Villager" magazine editorial team and the Neighbourhood Development Plan steering group. I hope that both will yield a legacy for the communities of the two villages.

But my last reflection is about the people I will miss. No matter what you think about your parish council, the members are there to do their bit to help the community. They are very good people and good company. I will miss them.



AND IT'S "GOODBYE" AS WELL FROM MHAIRI

Mhairi Mackie was a member of the Dobwalls and Trewidland Parish Council and the previous editor of "The Villager". She, like Hugh, decided not to stand in the May elections.

I found being part of the NDP was enjoyable and inter-


esting, so I put my name forward for a parish council vacancy and was coopted in February 2020.

DOBWALLS MEMORIAL HALL CAR PARK AN APPEAL FROM THE HALL TRUSTEES

"The biggest bone of contention for most people in the Dobwalls area is the hall car park" - and those are the words of the hall trustees' chairman Alan Mayne.

Here Alan clarifies the situation: "When the gates to the car park are left open lorries, tractors and other large vehicles use the car park as a turning circle and just churn up the surface and cause significant damage. The quotes we have had to resurface the car park have been upwards of £25000.

"Our treasurer has tried many avenues seeking funding but has met with a resounding 'no' on every occasion. If anyone can suggest how this money can be found please get in touch with me. I would be happy to meet up with anyone and discuss any options.



"The trustees would like to thank Richard Doran for all his help in making temporary repairs at no cost to the hall. So the car park will continue to be available for school pick up and drop off for the foreseeable future."

But Alan warns the situation will be reviewed if the surface continues to deteriorate.

AND NOW, FOR SOME BETTER NEWS ABOUT THE HALL!

There has been a prolonged period of

maintenance at the hall. Alan says the hall was fortunate to receive a few grants over the lockdown periods and these have been put to very good use, upgrading some rather old equipment.

But, there was also an unforeseen challenge in March when the upper ceiling fell onto the suspended ceiling, thanks to storm force winds. The hall insurers were very helpful in providing the funds to carry out repairs and the work will be ongoing over the next few months.

Alan says the trustees have worked very hard over the lockdown periods updating the hall interior and exterior. Christine Seaman voluntarily carried out the mammoth task of making new curtains for the windows and stage. The foyer, toilets and main hall have had a repaint and a new carpet has been fitted in the foyer. There's a new sound system and an induction loop added for people with hearing loss. The kitchen has a new boiler and new heaters have been ordered to replace some very old and tired equipment.

"Overall, a lot of work has taken place in the last two years to improve what was a very tired hall and the effect is truly amazing," adds Alan.

The hall is having a series of charity bingos on the first Saturday of each month. If your charity would like to be considered please get in touch. The hall's own bingo, for hall funds, is on the third Saturday of each month. All bingo sessions are eyes down at 7.00pm.



After missing out last year, the hall Craft Fair will be on Saturday, October 23. If you want to book a table, contact Alan, also if you want to make a hall booking of any kind.

And, Alan says it's very much hoped a boxing tournament will take place in the hall in the

near future.

Alan adds: "A very small group runs the hall and we, like many other organisations, are looking for more help.

"If anyone can spare a few hours a month, please get in touch. One of main jobs we need help with is setting up and clearing the room after bingos and other functions."

The hall trustees meet on the 3rd Monday of each month in the hall at 7.00pm.
